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WAUSAU HIGH SCHOOL.

Completed and Opened For School Purposes Yesterday Morning.

The Finest High School Building in Wisconsin, and One of Which We Are Proud.

Nothing could have been more appropriate for the opening of the new Hight School than the ideal autumnal weather of yesterday. The scholars old and young, reflected the joy of the day in their delight over the appointments of this great temple of learning. The long weeks of anxious waiting had at last ended, and now the reward had come in the form of a school building that has few equals in the Northwest and an assembly room without a peer anywhere

When the electric program clock sounded the call to order, at 8:30 A. M., almost 300 pupils took their seats in the large assembly, room,—the room that is to be the study room of the high school, county training school and eighth grades, and where they are to be seated when not

reciting their lessons.

At 9 o'clock the electric clock sounded the signals for the pupils of the first floor and within a short time six of the eight rooms were filled, there being a kindergarten, a sub-primary, a first primary, a fourth grade, a sixth and a seventh seated in these rooms. From the remarkable growth of our city it looks as if the two remaining rooms would

Now that the building is practically completed it might not be out of place to give a more detailed description of it than has heretofore

been presented.

The building is constructed of red pressed brick and Bedford limestone and is finished in red oak, the floors being maple. It is in the English collegiate style of architecture and is arranged primarily for practical school purposes, no detail of lighting, ventilating, on warming being overlooked. The seats are all adjustable so that each pupil has a seat that fits him. The light in every case falls over the left shoulder; while the practical Venetian blind protects the eye from the glare of rooms the sum. The ventilation is assured through the operation of a large Blackman fan, run by two water motors. The whole school operates as a unit through the absolute precision of a Frick program clock which sides the eight class room there are on this floor a teacher's room, a rings all signals, and operates secondary clocks placed in the various rooms so that all teachers have exactly the same time. This arrangement separtoflet from the principle from the grades below, and permits them to go directly south rooms on this floor overlook the city and part of east hill. Two of Electric light fixtures every where indicate that the building can be used at night for various purposes.

But let us step into the basement. Here we find a large south room which is some day to be fitted up for manual training. It runs over 80 feet in length. This room has its counterpart in the south rooms, east of this, which are to be used for instruction in domestic science. Thus the industrial side, so often neglected, yet constituting the larger part of a city's life, is here recognized and will some day receive its proper dues. At either end of the basement is a bicycle room, the one at the floor, its arched ceiling set off in oak panels and studded with electric cated on a site covering six and one-third acres, giving ample room for west for the boys, the east room for the girls. Here are also shower bath rooms and dressing rooms which lead to the gymnasium. This spacious

There are four large entrances from the street to the building. The outh and north entrances are used by the pupils on the first floor. Betext book room and two toilet rooms.

On the second floor are found eight recitation rooms, to be used by the county training school. high school and eighth grade scholars, the officers of the Board, the City Superintendent, the High School Principal and the Principal of the Training School.
